Nursing Care Center Accreditation Standards

Effective July 1, 2022, all Joint Commission-accredited nursing care centers (NCCs) will have 29 new and 55 revised standards and elements of performance (EPs) that will span multiple accreditation manual chapters. The revisions reflect the most current clinical practice guidelines and best practices for infection control, dementia care, staff recruitment, retention and wellness, pressure injuries, and medication safety. As part of the standards review process, The Joint Commission looked at key topics that are most likely to impact the quality and safety of patients and residents in the long-term care and memory care settings. Several of the updates also reflect lessons learned from the COVID-19 pandemic.

In addition, there will be 10 new and 4 revised EPs for NCCs that participate in the Memory Care Certification program that align with the Alzheimer's Association's dementia care practice recommendations. These new and revised standards were designed with the primary goal of improving quality and safety in these settings.

To provide support to organizations implementing these new requirements, we have added additional resources and tools at the end of this R3.

Engagement with stakeholders, customers, and experts

In addition to a review of the scientific literature and practice guidelines from nationally recognized industry leaders, The Joint Commission also conducted the following field reviews:

- Public Field Review open to all professionals with expertise in the long-term care and memory care settings. The field review was posted on The Joint Commission website, posted on LinkedIn, and sent to accredited NCCs and NCCs certified in memory care.
- [Standards Review Panel \(SRP\)](#) experts in the field of long-term care and dementia care who provided a "boots on the ground" point of view and insights into the practical application of the proposed standards.

Comprehensive Accreditation Manual for Nursing Care Centers

Requirement	For the NCC accreditation project, 84 new and revised standards and EPs were developed, and 5 EPs were removed or consolidated. Rationale	During the COVID-19 pandemic, the long-term care industry was heavily impacted by the effects of the virus. Post-pandemic analysis exposed weaknesses in care practices and emergency preparedness. Some of the weaknesses were a result of long-standing industry challenges such as insufficient staffing and the lack of resources. In addition, new challenges like social isolation emerged as organizations worked diligently to keep their staff, patients/residents, and community safe. The Centers for Disease Control

	<p>and Prevention and their linked resources were primary sources of information for our standards review.</p> <p>The pandemic also illuminated the negative effects on staff and staffing, including retention and recruitment, which are still posing challenges for the long-term care industry. The pandemic also showed the importance of having an emergency preparedness plan that includes staff contingencies and safe practices during infectious disease outbreaks and other emergencies. Lastly, the pandemic also revealed strains on staff wellness and the importance of providing support and resources for staff so that they do not become demotivated or experience physical or mental burnout.</p> <p>Pressure injuries continue to be a high-risk factor for patients and residents in long-term care because of compromised body systems related to aging and/or illness and medical device use. The National Pressure Injury Advisory Council released an updated version of their pressure injury guidelines in 2019. The NCC standards address prevention and treatment practices aimed at reducing the incidence of pressure injuries and, when they occur, to prevent them from worsening and becoming life altering or even deadly.</p> <p>The Joint Commission also reviewed all NCC standards related to dementia care to make sure they aligned with the latest evidence, including the most recent Dementia Care Practice Recommendations from the Alzheimer’s Association.</p>

Requirement	For the NCC Memory Care project, 14 new and revised standards and EPs were developed. All new and revised requirements can be found on the Prepublication Standards page of The Joint Commission’s website until June 30, 2022. On July 1, 2022, please access through E-dition or the standards manual.
Rationale	Best practices for dementia care continue to evolve as the scientific evidence evolves and expands. Therefore, it is important to continually incorporate the latest evidence and best practice guidelines into the Memory Care Certification standards. In our efforts to keep the MCC program current and relevant, The Joint Commission reviewed the latest version of the Alzheimer’s Association’s (ALZ) recommendations and then made revisions to the standards in collaboration with ALZ.
